The Man With "Unlimited Stamina"

It is amazing that even in his 20th year, LeBron James is still a top ten player in the NBA. His stats are: 24.9 points per game, 8.8 rebounds per game, and 6.9 assists per game to go along with a 44 inch vertical jump at 37 years old.

Other players who played 20 or more seasons did not play nearly as well in their 20th season. For example, Vince Carter had 5.4 points per game, 2.5 rebounds per game, and 1.2 assists per game in his 20th season. Another legendary Hall of Fame player, Kareem Abdul-Jabbar only averaged 10.1 ppg, 4.5 rbg, and 1.0 apg in his 20th season. That shows how good LeBron is in his 20th season compared to other legends.

Lebron is only 1,076 points away from having the most points ever, a record that is currently held by Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. Kareem has 38,387 total points, while LeBron has 37,311 total points. LeBron will probably beat that record because he will play more seasons than Kareem. Last year, Lebron scored 1,695 points, so it seems likely that Lebron will break the record this season if he does not get injured or miss time.

So with Lebron about to break the record and having a much better 20th NBA season than anyone else who has played a 20th season, it shows how great Lebron's career has been. By Owen Dicks

The Opening of King Tut's Tomb

It might be shocking, but 100 years ago, the great King Tut's tomb was opened.

On November 4, 1922, a team led by British Egyptologist Howard Carter, began excavating the tomb of Tutankhamun in the Valley of the Kings, Egypt. Tutankhamun, nicknamed King Tut, was an Egyptian pharaoh who ruled from 1333 BCE (when he was just nine years old!) until his death in 1323 BCE.

After he died, Tutankhamun was mummified, according to tradition, and buried in a tomb filled with art, jewelry, and treasures like gold. Desert sands and sand storms hid the tomb, and it stayed hidden for more than 3,000 years. On November 4, Carter's team found the first step of a staircase. The next day, his team dug up the whole staircase, it turns out that same staircase led to the tomb itself. By November 26, they uncovered an antechamber, a treasury, and the door to the tomb itself.

After much effort to open the door to the tomb, Carter saw a room filled with gold treasures. But it wasn't until much later that the sarcophagus containing Tutankhamun's mummy was revealed. Howard Carter died more than 10 years after the discovery due Hodgkin's disease on March 2, 1939. By Zoe Leopold

The Longest Year Ever

1972 (50 Years Ago)

A fun fact about 1972 to start: in UTC Time, 1972 was the longest year ever, with two extra leap seconds during this 366-day leap year. On January 4, the first handheld calculator was introduced and could be bought for \$395. A day later, on January 5, President Richard Nixon ordered the development of a Space Shuttle program. Starting on February 3, the Winter Olympics were held in Sapporo, Japan. On March 2, the *Pioneer 10* spacecraft was launched from Cape Kennedy. On May 24, the Magnavox Odyssey, the first home gaming system, was demoed. It releases in August. On a related note, Atari, another video game company, was founded on June 26. On August 4, one of the biggest solar flares ever recorded knocked out cable lines in the U.S. On October 28, the Airbus A300 flew for the first time. On November 29, Atari released Pong, which sold over 35,000 units and was the first game to achieve commercial success. On December 14, Eugene Cernan was the last person to walk on the moon (currently) on the Apollo 17 moonwalk. Days later, on the 19th, Apollo 17 returned to Earth.

History

What Happened 100 years ago?

1922 (100 Years Ago)

100 years ago on January 11, the first successful insulin treatment for diabetes was made in Toronto by Frederick Banting. Almost a month later, on February 8, the first radio was installed in the White House for President Warren G. Harding. On March 20, the USS *Langley* was commissioned as the first U.S. Navy aircraft carrier. April 13, Massachusetts opened all public offices to women. On May 5, construction started on the Yankee Stadium. An important event: On May 30, the Lincoln Memorial was dedicated in Washington, D.C. (Picture shown off to the side). On July 11, the open-air Hollywood Bowl amphitheater opened. Not much significant happened during September or October, but on November 4, King Tut's tomb was found. In December, Stan Lee was born on the 28th and was a comic book writer and publisher, and the chairman of Marvel Comics.

College of the Month

The Rhode Island School of Design

Do you like art and designing? Ever thought about enrolling in a top university for creative and artistic people like yourself? Even if the answer is no, please read this article. It might spark interest in yourself. Even if it doesn't, you might want to know some interesting facts about the college of the month ... the *Rhode Island School of Design*, or the RSLD for short!

Straight into it—RLSD. The *Rhode Island School of Design* is one of the oldest art and design schools in the world. It is founded in March 22, 1877, by a small group of woman, 40 before woman was allowed the right to vote! At first, the school only offered two main directions, *Freehand Drawing and Painting* and *Mechanical Drawing and Design*. But as RISD grew and evolved, all sorts and forms of art were offered.

The *Rhode Island School of Design* has a requirement of SAT of at least a score of 1310—1480, which is a pretty high standard. Also, even then, there is an acceptance rate of 27.1%. As you might already see, the RISD is a pretty selective school. On top of that, the total fee with no aid is \$57,505, which is a lot higher than the average university cost.

Still, before you say "Nope, not going to even think about it," think about it again. If you are a perfect student but very poor, the RISD isn't going to turn you down. Instead, you will get financial aid. If you are a student that loves art, has a flair for it, and has determination and skill, the *Rhode Island School of Design* will be the dream school for you.
